DESCRIPTION

René Paris is a French animal sculptor born in 1881 and died in 1970 in Paris. He studied under the aegis of Georges Gardet and Victor Peter. Specialized in horse sculpture, he is able to capture the movement and grace of his models. His first exhibition took place at the Salon in Paris in 1897. Subsequently, he exhibited at the Salon des Artistes Français. He was awarded an honorable mention in 1907, won a medal in 1912, a silver medal in 1944 and a gold medal in 1920. He was also a member of the sculpture jury.
